



# ADVANCING SEXUAL HEALTH AND RIGHTS

## THE PROBLEM

Across the globe, women and girls face discrimination and alarming rates of violence. An estimated one in three women will be physically abused during her lifetime and will experience sexual violence or some other form of violence. In some developing countries, the numbers are even more devastating.

In addition, many women and girls lack the autonomy, knowledge and community support to make critical decisions about their health, education, professions, sexuality, relationships and marriage. For example, 15 million girls under the age of 18 enter into early or forced marriages each year, making them more prone to a wide range of problems: they are more likely to be illiterate, live in poverty, face domestic violence and die in childbirth.

Similarly, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and intersex (LGBTQI) people in many places face harassment, discrimination, violence and even murder. Many are ostracized simply for who they are or whom they love. Sadly, more than 75 countries have enshrined hatred and bigotry into law, making homosexuality illegal—punishable by prison terms and, in some cases, by death.

- Pursue equal opportunities in society without limitations based on gender or sexual orientation
- Make decisions about their body, health and life
- Live free from violence, abuse and hate

## OUR SOLUTION

To counter these challenges, AJWS supports 155 social change organizations working to advance the human rights of women, girls and LGBTQI people. Our courageous grantees are on the frontlines fighting discrimination, educating communities about their health and rights, combating violence and hate crimes, and ensuring that women, girls and LGBTQI people can live healthy lives and pursue their aspirations with dignity.

We are helping grassroots groups grow stronger and more sustainable, lending them visibility and ensuring their concerns are included in broader social change efforts at the local, national and global levels to build strong movements capable of ushering in lasting change.

## OUR IMPACT AROUND THE WORLD

The activists, organizations and movements we support are making progress in their communities and around the globe:

- In Kenya, after hundreds violently attacked an HIV/AIDS clinic near Mombasa, **Initiative for Equality and Non Discrimination (INEND)** began building a culture of tolerance. INEND trained over 320 boda boda (motorbike taxi) drivers—many of whom were among the attackers—to be compassionate LGBTQI allies, and together they are making Kenya a more accepting and open place for LGBTQI people.
- In September 2018, the Indian Supreme Court made history by striking down Section 377 of the Constitution, which made consensual sex between same-sex adults illegal. **Creating Resources for Empowerment in Action** and other AJWS grantees helped lead this charge for equality in India, and millions of LGBTQI Indians are now freer to safely be who they are and love who they love.

In 2019, AJWS invested \$5.4 million in 161 social change organizations in 8 countries to promote sexual health and rights.

- Amid ongoing cases of sexual violence against women in India, **Vanangana, SANGRAM** and **Association for Advocacy and Legal Initiatives** lobbied to strengthen India's weak anti-rape laws. In March of 2013, their efforts helped bring about the passage of a new law that prohibits sexual harassment, stalking and other related offenses and broadens the legal definition of rape. In Democratic Republic of Congo in 2015, female survivors of sexual violence won 214 court cases against their abusers with legal aid from AJWS grantees **SOFEPAI** and **DFJ**.
